Chairman's Introduction

Our AGM was held at the end of March, and I know not everyone was able to attend. I thought, therefore, I'd take his opportunity to summarise the main points I covered in my address.

The Centre has held its own over the past year having faced a number of difficulties. These have included recruiting and retaining members, falling interest in trips and events, uncertainty about the future of the Hazlemere Community Centre, the recruitment of committee members, problems with getting venues to commit and conditions being imposed upon us centrally by the National Trust.

Our membership to-day stands at about 180, down from just over 200 at the end of last year and well down on our pre-Covid peak of 280. We continue to appeal for and try to recruit new members. Two of the Committee stood down at the AGM. We said a huge thank you to Agnieszka Kearney for her many years of dedicated service as Raffles Coordinator and goodbye too to Kathy Minall who resigned for personal reasons. We have significant gaps in our committee which are only filled by certain people doubling up on roles. The National Trust is trying to impose new conditions upon us for us to maintain our affiliation status. These include but are not limited to formulating safeguarding policies and procedures, a complaints procedure, policies to comply with the Equality Act and a Values Statement (whatever that might mean!). There does seem to be a lack of understanding about what we do and how we operate as a group.

But all was not doom and gloom. We managed to run a full programme of events form the Spring Lunch in March through to the trip to see the Wisley lights in December and had a whole range of stimulating and varied talks. We hope to run as full and interesting programme of talks and events this year and, of course, if you have any suggestions and/or comments to make then we'd be happy to listen to them.

I spoke at last year's AGM about developing a website for the Centre. I'm pleased to be able to report that a shell has now been completed, and I'll be starting to populate the various pages with information over the coming days. The site will advertise who we are and what we do and, hopefully, will be instrumental in the recruitment of new members. Once it's been completed, I'll provide you with more information.

The AGM also agreed a donation of $\pounds 5,000$ to be paid to the National Trust, the money to be split $\pounds 2,500$ to Hughenden Manor, $\pounds 2,000$ to Cliveden and $\pounds 500$ to Nuffield Place.

Late Breaking News

I heard at the end of last week that Hazlemere Community Centre has been awarded the status of Asset of Community Value. The status has legal status, the centre is on a formal register that is governed in law. The status is awarded for 5 years but the Centre can apply to renew at the end of that period.

So, what does the status mean and how is it of importance to us? The status gives the Community Centre a level of protection against external threats and covers the area of both the building and the car park. The landowner cannot do anything with the land unless they express a clear intention to do and there is a consultation period of at least six months. This will prevent a recurrence of such situations as when Bucks County Council made the land over to Sir William Ramsay School without referring to the HCA. In such circumstances, there would be penalties on the landowner that breached the restrictions now in place. Given the sometimes fraught relationship the Community Centre has with the school, this change of status is something that s really important. It helps safeguard the future of the Community Centre and that's important to us because it's been our home for some many years. If the Community Centre were to close, then it would probably mark the end of the NTWC as well.

If you were one of the people living locally who wrote in support of the application, then my sincere thanks to you. The NTWC submitted a note of support arguing the importance of the Community Centre for our very existence. I'm told that over 302 letters/statements of support were submitted.

I spoke at the AGM of the difficulties we face as a centre. It seems as if a resolution to the problems at the Community Centre at least in part, is at hand.

Payment for Membership Subscriptions and Events

At the start of this year, our bankers – Lloyds – changed our two accounts from Business Accounts to Community Accounts. They have also started to charge us for banking services.

The charges are based on how much work we ask the bank to do. The more work we perform ourselves or which happens automatically, the less we are charged.

One of our greatest costs involves the paying-in of cheques. Not only does this involve us in listing the details of all cheques paid-in but the bank must also manually verify all of the details. If a cheque contains an error which we haven't previously spotted, the bank writes to us with the details. Costs are involved both in verifying cheques and in notifying us of errors.

It's for this reason that we ask, whenever possible, you pay your membership subs. and trip costs by bank transfer rather than by cheque. Internet banking is quick, easy and safe and all payments made show on your statement. For us, checking payments by bank transfer is also a simple process and avoids us having to visit the bank to pay-in cheques. We will still accept payment by cheque if there's no other way open to you, but we do urge you to use bank transfer if possible if only as a means of reducing the dreaded bank charges!

Parking at Hazlemere Community Centre

Outing to MILESTONES MUSEUM, Basingstoke – 5th March

42 of us went on a trip down memory lane when we visited the Milestones Museum, Hampshire's Museum of Living History, last month.

Milestones takes you back to what life used to be like in Hampshire from the Victorian era to the 1930's and 40's. There were cobbled streets to walk down to explore the many houses and all kinds of shops typical of the period. There was a sweet shop, Abrahams, where you could buy a 1940's ration of humbugs, gobstoppers etc., and a wonderful teddy bear museum. You could also, as we did, go into the Baverstock Arms (named after James Baverstock, the first person to make use of a hydrometer in the brewing process) to enjoy a leisurely pint, play vintage pub games or just listen to a pianist playing popular old tunes.

There were more than 60 vehicles and steam engines on display, as well as the tools and equipment used to make them. Taskers of Andover (tractors, steam engines, road vehicles and lorry trailers), Thornycroft of Basingstoke (commercial and military vehicles and high-quality cars) and Wallis & Stevens of Basingstoke (traction engines and steam rollers) were the three manufacturers of note. There were also vintage motorbikes and bicycles to look at and admire.

On one side of the main area was a fantastic penny arcade where you could stroll along the boardwalk as well as learn about the history of piers and view traditional seaside scenes. There were vintage arcade games from claw grabbers and shove pennies to table football, all operated using "old style" money.

There were several parties of school children visiting the museum whilst we were there, most dressed as they would have been in Victorian times or the early 1900's. One group of children was outside a shop where a game of hopscotch had been drawn on the pavement. Needless to say, some of our lady members could not resist showing them how it was done! Also one of our more mature ladies, whose name I will not mention, was seen demonstrating how to spin a hula hoop round her waist and arms.

I hope everyone enjoyed their trip into the past. I know Alan and I did.

There will also be time to explore the other attractions Greenwich has to offer – the beautiful park, the Naval Museum with its cafe, the Cutty Sark and the fabulous Market where you'll find shops and stalls full of art, antiques, crafts and clothing – they've got almost everything! If you're a foodie, fashionista or collector there's no better place to visit in London.

BOOKING FORM FOR ROCKINGHAM CASTLE, CORBY - TUESDAY 17 JUNE 2025

Rockingham Castle was built on the instructions of William the Conqueror and was held by the Crown for 450 years. It was bought from James I by Lewis Watson and has been in the family ever since.

Whether it is images of knights in shining armour, a Tudor House, a Victorian home staffed with servants, or contemporary art, Rockingham has it all.

There are 13 acres of formal gardens and wooded ravine to explore, with stunning herbaceous borders, roses, yew hedges, terraces, a stumpery and spectacular views over the surrounding countryside.

Charles Dickens visited Rockingham Castle on several occasions and often performed his plays in the Panel Room. The Castle has been used as a principal setting for the BBC civil war period drama "By the Sword Divided" and also featured in "Top Secret".
